

Mikee Villaflor, the Director of Nurses for Nurses (NFN) had the opportunity to visit Nicaragua in February 2019. She was able to meet with our local partners. She spent time in local clinics, participated in public outreach programs, and opened the dialogue for international development with local Nicaraguan healthcare professionals. During her time there, she was able to learn more about the Nicaraguan health care system while identifying NFN opportunities to empower local nurses to improve health care access to rural populations.



This year, NFN had additional dedicated volunteers join the team that worked together in strengthening and supporting NFN's vision, direction and events throughout the year. The NFN team held a Yoga in the Park fundraiser that also included a silent auction in June 2019. This successful event raised over \$1,000. These funds will go towards NFN's project for the coming year.

## **Financials**

**In 2019, we raised \$9,400 from public donations.** All of these funds will go towards paying for the medical education of four amazing young people (Bryan, Kimberly, Brandon and Victor) who can't wait to start helping people in their home communities.


We spent \$15,900 of which \$13,700 went to empowering local heros and \$2,200 for operations (this includes our new Executive Director in Nicaragua).

All of the money donated from the public and private organizations in 2019 went directly to supporting our student programs, namely Bryan, Kimberly, Brandon and Victor who are at various stages of their medical journey. Our operational costs are covered by the private donations of our Board of Directors, core donors and gifts in kind.
